## Charak Pharmaceuticals Wins Case against Glenmark over Drug Name

HC asks Glenmark to rename its drug Econova within four weeks

he Bombay High Court has granted relief to ayurvedic drugmaker Charak Pharmaceuticals in a sixyear-old case involving its product Evanova, directing **Glenmark** Pharmaceuticals to rename its drug Econova within four weeks since its name is deceptively similar.

Physicians and pharmacists

could mistakenly prescribe the wrong drug due to similar names, the high court held in its judgment on Thursday. "Very often, many prescriptions are made via telephone to the pharmacist and others are handwritten and frequently handwriting is not legible, Justice SJ Kathawala observed while passing the order.

Mumbai-based Charak Pharma had filed a case for perpetual order restraining Glenmark from infringing its registered trademark of 'Evanova' by use of the mark 'Econova' or any other mark deceptively similar to its registered mark.

"I am prima facie satisfied that the defendant's mark 'Econova' is deceptively similar to the plaintiff's mark 'Evanova',"

Glenmark Pharma argued, "Since May 2006, the company has been extensively using the trademark 'Econova' and enjoys immense reputation and goodwill of its own.

Charak Pharma, however, said, "Both the marks are visually and structurally absolutely similar with seven letters words beginning with 'E' and ending with 'nova'. There is likelihood and in any case a possibility of the middle words to be slurred over."

Glenmark will withdraw the trademark application by February 15, the spokesperson said.

Queries to Charak Pharma via email and phone calls remained unanswered.
